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# About the SD186ER Demonstration Board

The AMD SD186ER Demonstration Board is designed as an exceptionally small, low-cost product for demonstration of the AMD Am186<sup>TM</sup>ER microcontroller. See page ix for a block diagram of the board.

The SD186ER demonstration board is a stand-alone evaluation platform for the Am186ER microcontroller. The Am186ER microcontroller integrates 32 Kbyte of RAM along with peripherals such as 13 chip-select controllers, one asynchronous serial port, one synchronous serial port, 32 programmable I/Os, three timers, an interrupt controller, and a hardware watchdog timer to increase system functionality while reducing overall cost. The memory controller supports a glueless connection to EPROM, Flash memory, pseudo-static RAM, and SRAM. The Am186ER microcontroller also features an innovative bus design that frees the processor to run at nearly twice the speed of standard 80C186 processors while using commodity memory devices.

The SD186ER demonstration board is designed with a 104-pin Am186 expansion interface that provides access to the Am186ER microcontroller signals. The Am186 expansion interface facilitates prototyping with external devices by using the SD186ER demonstration board as the minimal system core of a design.

The SD186ER demonstration board highlights the Am186ER microcontroller's asynchronous serial port, internal RAM, glueless interface to Flash memory, and expansion interface to peripheral attachments. A complete description of the board can be found in Chapter 2, "Demonstration Board Functional Description".

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# Theory of Operation

The SD186ER demonstration board demonstrates the basic processor functionality and features of the Am186ER microcontroller, and the simplicity of its system design. As a stand-alone platform, the board enables you to test the Am186ER microcontroller's performance and functionality. The minimal number of components on the board exhibits the integration present in the processor.

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## Demonstration Board Features

- E86™ family boot monitor (E86MON™) board-resident utility

- Am186 104-pin expansion interface
- One RS-232 serial port with DB-9 connector
- Activity LED indicators for PIO signals
- Power-on LED indicator
- Reset circuitry

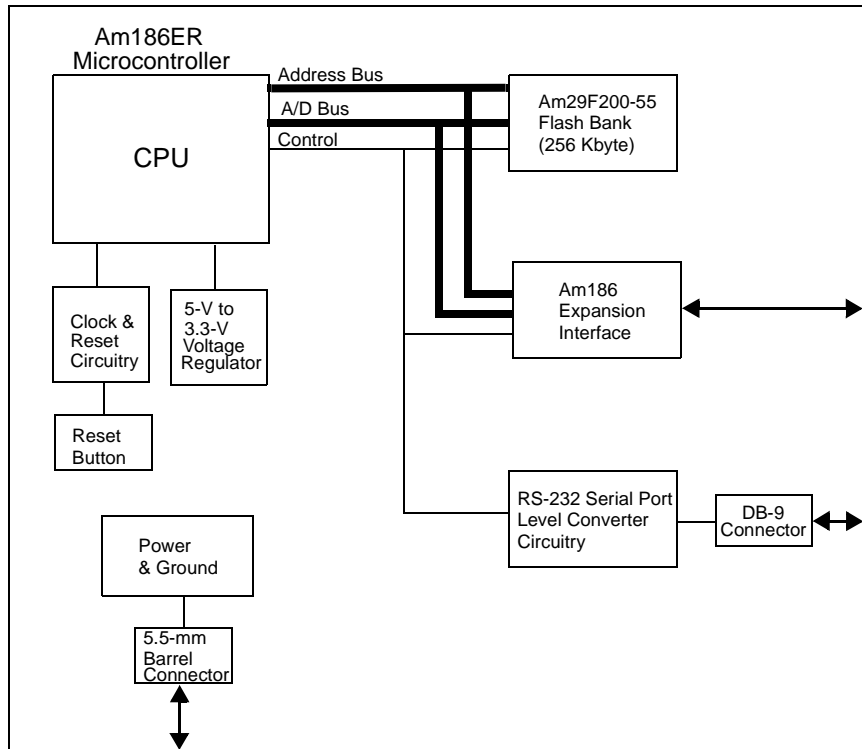


Figure 0-1. SD186ER Demonstration Board Block Diagram

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# Connecting to a PC

Follow the steps below to connect the SD186ER demonstration board to your PC.

## Installation Requirements

The items listed below are necessary to install and run the SD186ER demonstration board:

- PC with an available COM port
- Terminal emulation software (such as Microsoft Windows® Terminal or ProComm Plus) that supports ASCII file transfers, software flow control (Xon/Xoff), and *send break* capability
- Power source for universal power supply

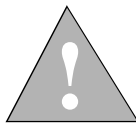
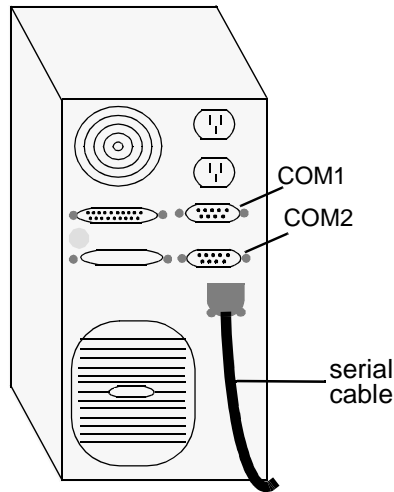
## Board Installation



**CAUTION: As with all computer equipment, the SD186ER demonstration board may be damaged by electrostatic discharge (ESD). Please take proper ESD precautions when handling any board.**

1. Remove the board from the shipping carton. Visually inspect the board to verify that it was not damaged during shipment.

2. Connect the demonstration board's DB-9 serial port to an available COM port. Use the serial cable included in the SD186ER demonstration board kit and note that a DB-9 to DB-25 serial connector adapter is provided if your host system requires it. The pinout of the demonstration board's serial connector is shown on page 2-7.



**DANGER:** Make sure the power supply is *not* plugged into an electrical outlet before connecting it to the SD186ER demonstration board.

3. Connect the power supply to the barrel connector on the SD186ER demonstration board.
4. Apply power to the board by connecting the power supply to an electrical outlet. Once the board is powered up, the LEDs (CR2–CR9) should flash in an oscillating pattern.



**CAUTION:** If using your own power supply, ensure that it is a 5-V supply. Using a 9-V supply will permanently damage the board. For more information, see “Power Supply” on page 2-12.

5. Invoke the terminal emulation program at 19200 baud, no parity, 8 data bits, and 1 stop bit; enable the software flow control (Xon/Xoff), if supported.

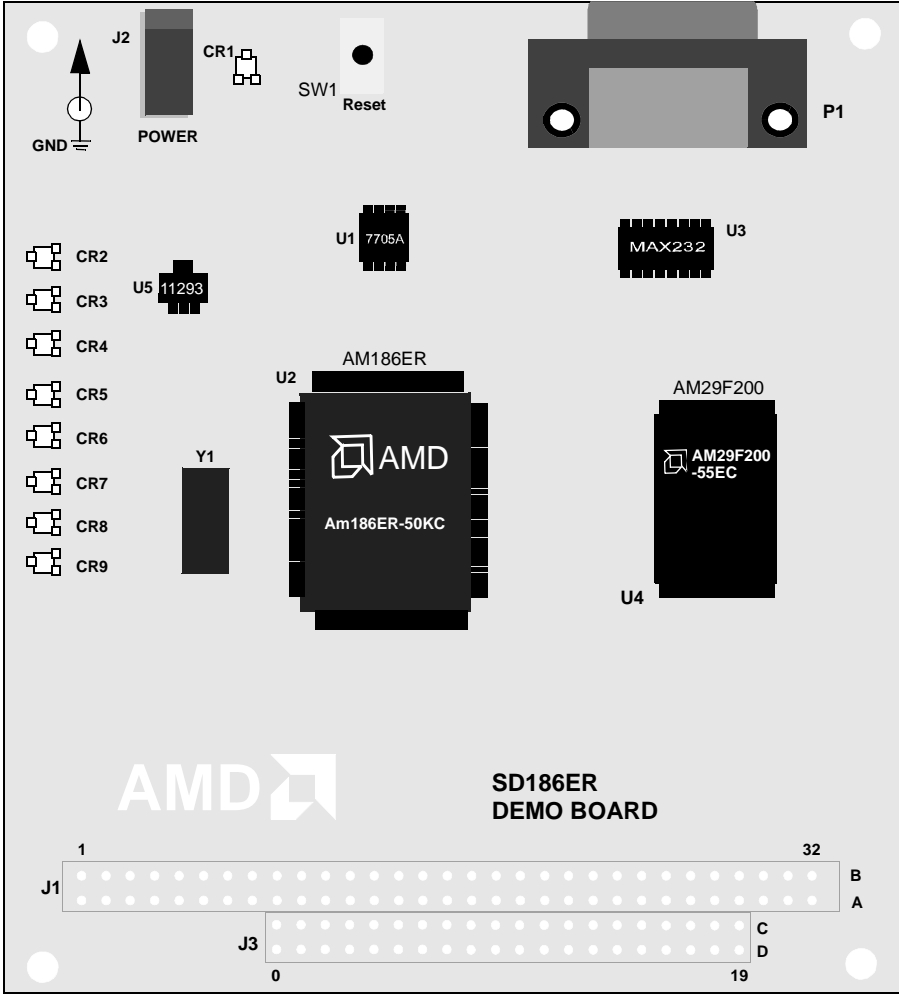


Figure 2-1. SD186ER Demonstration Board Layout

6. Reset the board by depressing and releasing the RESET switch (see location in Figure 2-1 on page 2-3). The LEDs on the board (CR2–CR9) will flash in an oscillating pattern for three seconds, as they did upon power up.

During the three-second period while the LEDs are oscillating, type an **a** in the terminal window to ensure that the E86MON software uses the correct baud rate. When the E86MON software receives an **a**, it adjusts its baud rate (if necessary) and displays the welcome message and prompt.

If you type a character other than an **a**, or type no character at all, the E86MON software still displays the welcome message and prompt, but may be using an incorrect baud rate. Depressing and releasing the RESET switch gives you another opportunity to type an **a**.

7. To display the version of the E86MON software and the commands available, type **?** and press Enter.

**Table 1-1. Installation Troubleshooting**

<b>Problem</b>	<b>Solution</b>
Nothing happens when pushing the RESET button.	Sometimes it is difficult to make a good connection when pushing the small RESET button. If all else fails, remove the power supply from the AC electrical outlet and disconnect and reconnect the power supply. The LEDs will flash in an oscillating pattern when the reset is successful.
The computer does not respond with the E86MON software prompt.	Reset the board by pressing the RESET switch and typing an <b>a</b> while the LEDs are flashing in an oscillating pattern. If this does not work, verify the power, check the cables, etc.
After typing <b>a</b> during reset, the terminal emulation software displays unreadable characters.	Check the baud rate setting for the terminal emulation software. It should be set to 19200. Also check the word length (8), stop bits (1), parity (N), and turn off any hardware flow control.
After a processor reset, the LEDs do not flash in the expected oscillating pattern.	Check that the power LED is on and the correct voltage is supplied to the board. Ensure that the polarity of the power connector is correct.
The terminal emulation program locks up the software or PC.	Check the COM port connection with the target board. Make sure that the same COM port is selected in the terminal emulation software. In some PCs if the correct COM port is not specified, the software will fail to function—it will lock in a continuous loop waiting for an answer from the incorrect serial port.
The power LED does not turn on with power.	Immediately disconnect the power supply. Ensure that the polarity of the power connector is correct. This is a very serious failure of the hardware. If the power source is connected incorrectly, the board will be permanently damaged.
There is a problem you cannot resolve.	Contact the AMD Corporate Applications technical support services (see Chapter 3, “Product Support” for phone numbers and more information).

# Chapter 2



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## Demonstration Board Functional Description

The SD186ER demonstration board provides a completely stand-alone microcontroller-based evaluation platform in a low-cost, exceptionally small form-factor product. The SD186ER demonstration board was designed to meet the needs of customers working with the Am186ER microcontroller.

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## Layout and Placement

The design of the SD186ER demonstration board emphasizes ease of use and small size. Refer to Figure 2-1 on page 2-3 for board layout and component placement.

The SD186ER demonstration board has the Flash memory device (U4) beside the processor. This placement keeps the memory device as close as possible to the processor to minimize noise and trace reflections. The 12.5-MHz fundamental mode crystal (Y1) is located to the left of the processor. The Am186 expansion interface (J1 and J3) is located at the bottom of the board for easy connection and access. Finally, the 5.5-mm power-supply barrel connector (J2) is positioned in the upper left corner of the board.

The RS-232 serial port has a DB-9 connector which is positioned in the upper right corner of the board (P1).

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# Am186ER Microcontroller Implementation

The SD186ER demonstration board supports the AMD Am186ER microcontroller. The board is shipped with an Am186ER microcontroller that operates at 50 MHz. Although not supported by the on-board crystal, the Am186ER microcontroller is also available in 25-, 33-, and 40-MHz operating frequencies.

The Am186ER microcontroller is designed to meet the most common requirements of embedded products developed for the communications, office automation, mass storage, and general embedded markets. Specific applications include feature phones, cellular phones, PBXs, multiplexers, modems, disk drive controllers, hand-held and desktop terminals, fax machines, line cards, managed hubs, and industrial control. Refer to the *Am186<sup>TM</sup>ER and Am188<sup>TM</sup>ER Microcontrollers Data Sheet* for more information on the specific features.

See Figure 2-2 on page 2-5 for a block diagrams detailing the Am186ER microcontroller's functionality.



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## ROM Space

The SD186ER demonstration board is populated with an Am29F200 256-Kbyte, 55-ns Flash memory device for use by the E86MON software and application code. The Am29F200 provides support for both 8- and 16-bit accesses.

The Flash memory device is mapped to the upper region of addressable memory at C0000h to FFFFFh. On the SD186ER demonstration board, the Flash memory device is configured as a 128K x 16-bit wide array. The Flash memory device has a nonsymmetrical sector configuration. Starting at the top of Flash memory, the sectors sizes are: 16 Kbyte, 8 Kbyte, 8 Kbyte, 32 Kbyte, 64 Kbyte, 64 Kbyte, and 64 Kbyte. The E86MON software only uses the top 16-Kbyte sector. The Flash memory device is connected to the  $\overline{UCS}$  (Upper Memory Chip Select) signal of the microcontroller. After a valid reset, the Am186ER microcontroller fetches the first instruction from the Flash memory device at address FFFF0h.

The E86MON software enables you to program the Flash memory device with specific types of hex files. Intel hex and Intel extended hex format files are supported. This software functionality is provided to eliminate the need to remove the Flash memory device for programming. Do not attempt to remove the TSOP Flash memory device (U4) because doing so may damage the board.

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## RAM Space

The SD186ER demonstration board demonstrates the integration of 32-Kbyte RAM within the Am186 microcontrollers. The internal RAM for the Am186 microcontroller is a 16K x 16-bit wide array (32 Kbyte), which provides the same performance as a 16-bit external zero-wait-state RAM. The internal RAM's location within the addressable memory on the SD186ER demonstration board is user configurable.

**NOTE:** The E86MON software maps the internal RAM from 0h to 7FFFh. Available user-application RAM resides from 410h to 7540h. See the *E86MON™ User's Manual* included in your kit for more information.

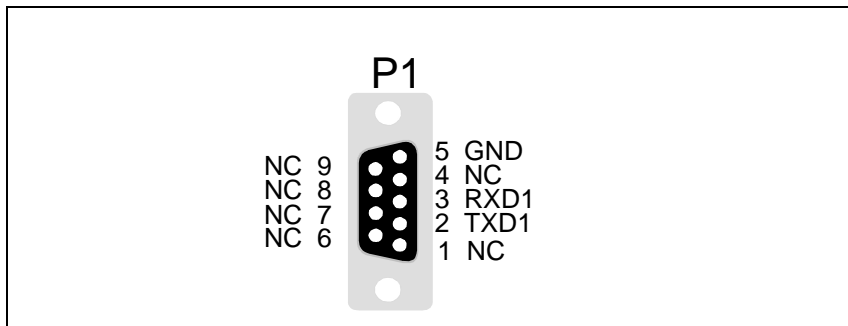

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## RS-232 Serial Port

The SD186ER demonstration board provides one on-board RS-232 serial port that is driven directly by the Am186ER microcontroller. The RS-232 serial port (P1) is equipped with a DB-9 connector. The pin assignment for the DB-9 connector is shown in Figure 2-3 below.

The RS-232 specification calls for signals that are driven at non-TTL levels. Single-chip RS-232 driver/receiver devices (MAX232) are used to convert to and from the required voltages.

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## Clock and Reset Logic

The Am186ER microcontroller can be configured for either a 4x, 1x, or ½x clock mode. As configured on the SD186ER demonstration board, the microcontroller is in a 4x clock mode. The input is generated by a 12.5-MHz fundamental mode crystal (Y1) that is connected to the X1/X2 inputs of the microcontroller, resulting in a 50-MHz system clock.

Solder pads are provided on the board to enable 1x and ½x clock modes. When installed, R4 connects  $\overline{\text{CLKSEL1}}$  to ground, and R7 connects  $\overline{\text{CLKSEL2}}$  to ground. These pads are normally unpopulated. You may install 100-kΩ resistors in either one of the two positions to enable 1x or ½x clock mode (see Table 2-2).

**NOTE:** Refer to the *Am186™ER and Am188™ER Microcontrollers Data Sheet* for detailed information on clock modes.

System reset is controlled by a voltage supply supervisor (TI TL7705ACD, U1). This device generates the processor's reset input, asserting the Am186ER microcontroller's RES pin for 13 ms when the RESET switch is depressed. The voltage supply supervisor also holds reset active when the power falls below 4.75 V.

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## Am186 Expansion Interface

The SD186ER demonstration board supports the PC/104 form-factor expansion-type connector for additional prototyping and testing. The traditional PC/104 signals are not present on the board; however, the Am186 expansion interface enables you to attach wirewrap or prototype boards that have the same standard physical interface. The pinout of the expansion interface is shown in the figures that follow.

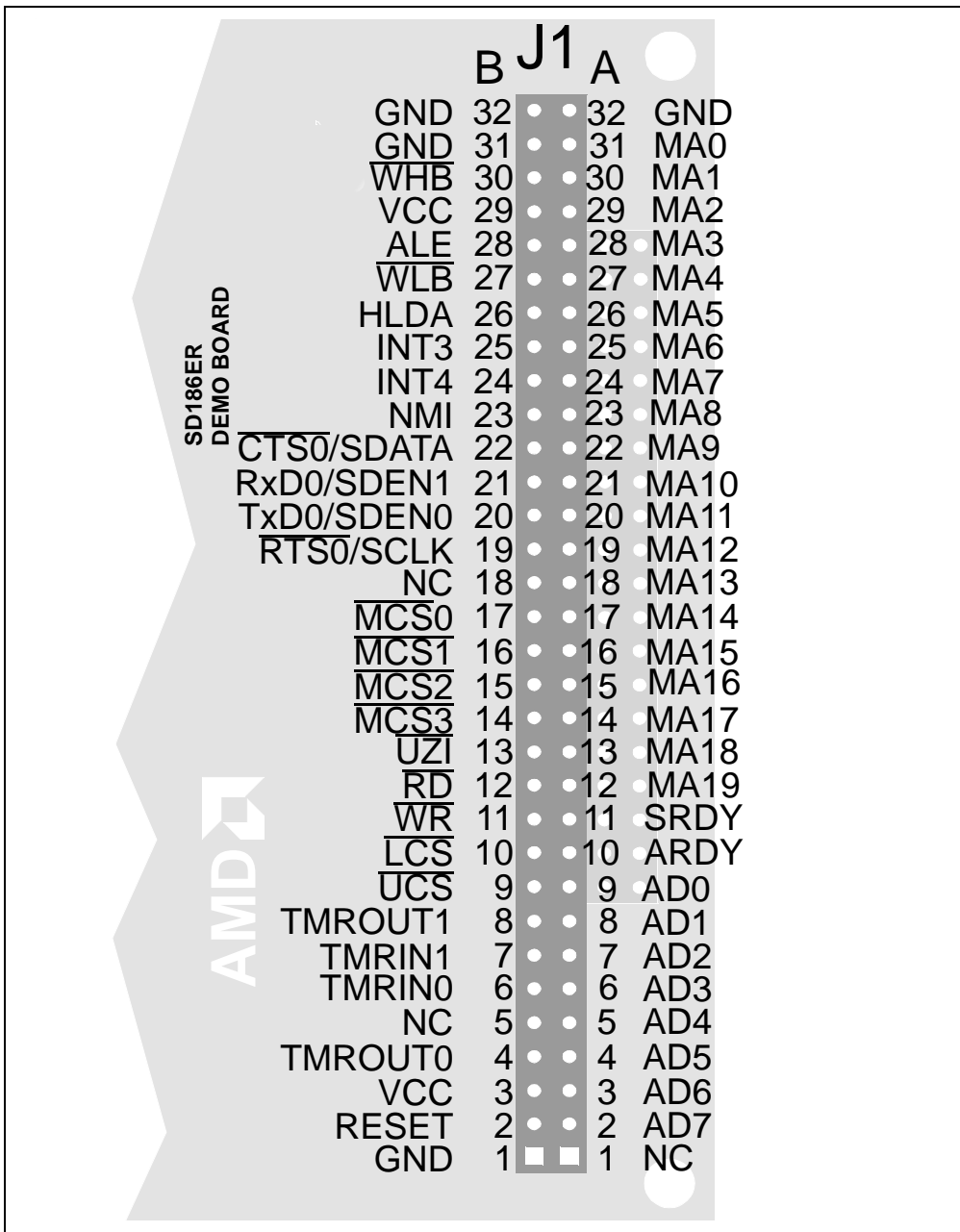


Figure 2-4. Am186 Expansion Interface Pinout (J1)

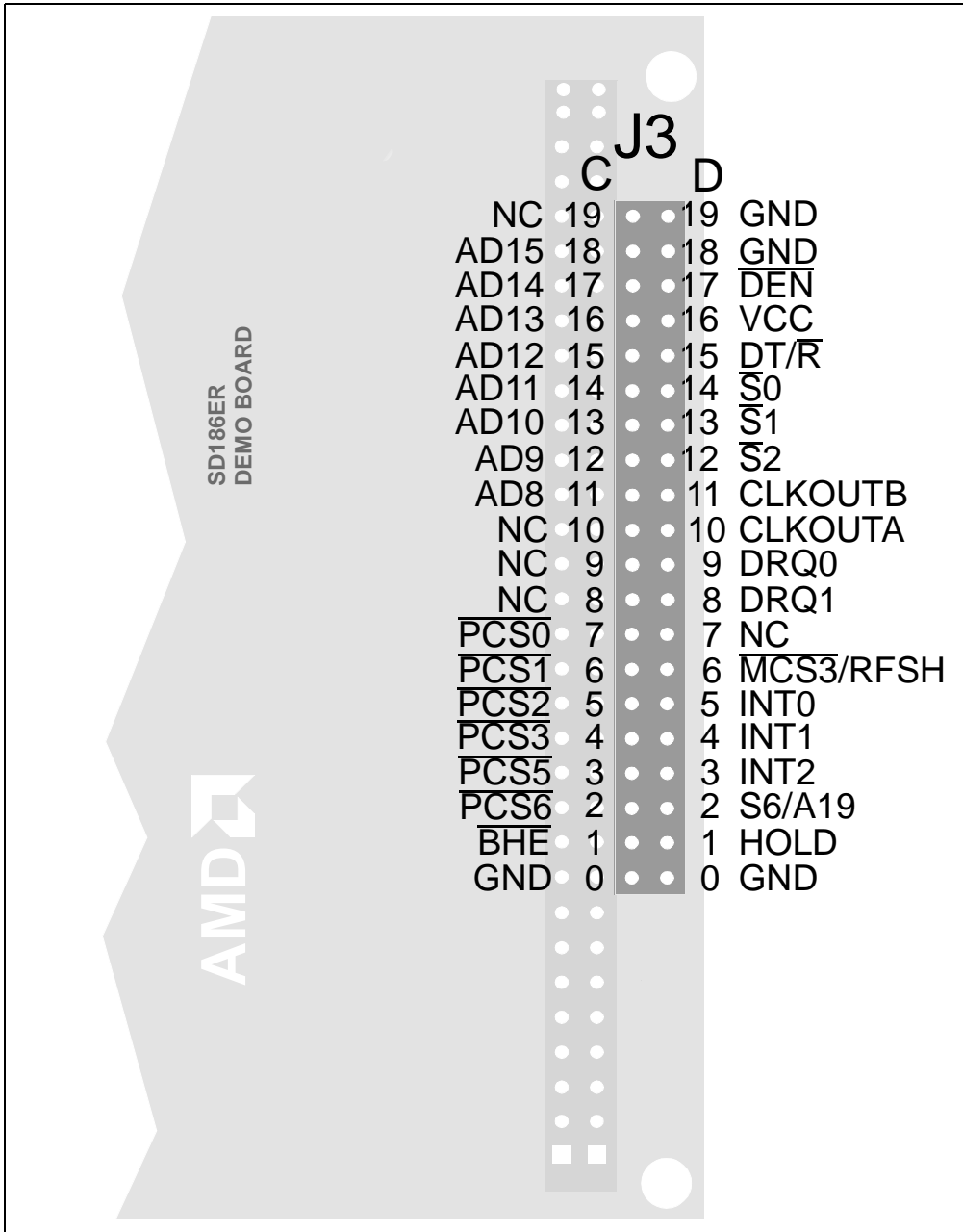


Figure 2-5. Am186 Expansion Interface Pinout (J3)

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## PIO Activity LED Indicators

The SD186ER demonstration board uses on-board LED indicators to show activity on eight programmable I/O (PIO) signals from the Am186ER microcontroller. Table 2-3 shows which PIO signal is represented by each LED.

# Power Supply

When used as a stand-alone board, the SD186ER demonstration board requires an input power supply of 5.0 V DC,  $\pm 5\%$ , 250 mA. The 3.3-V supply for the microcontroller is provided by the low drop-out voltage regulator U5.

When adding components to the SD186ER demonstration board via the Am186 expansion interface, additional power may be necessary.

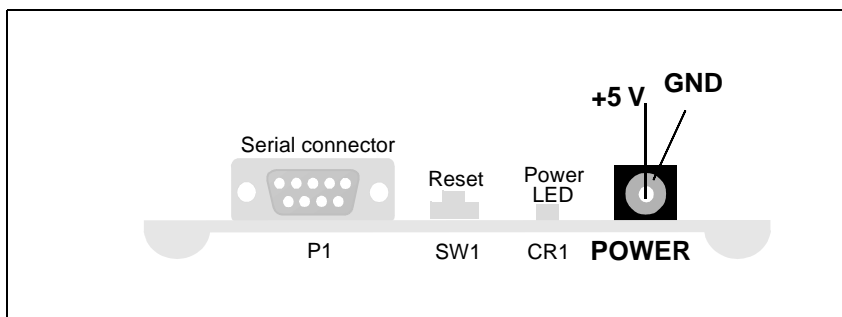


Figure 2-6. Power Supply Polarity

The power supply connector is a 5.5-mm barrel connector where the center post is  $V_{CC}$  and the outer ring is GND, as shown in Figure 2-6.

**CAUTION:** Use the 5-V universal power supply included with the kit. Using a 9-V supply will permanently damage the board.

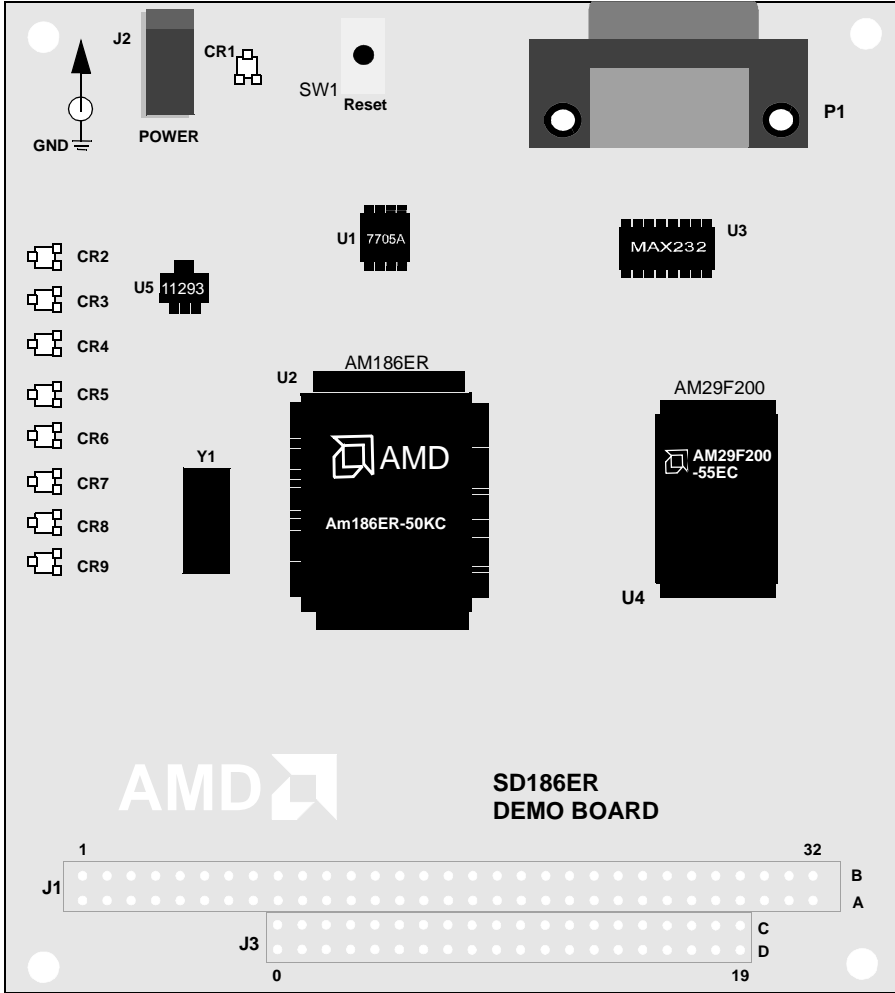


Figure A-1. SD186ER Demonstration Board Layout
